Welcome to our annual Newsletter. The support of so many parishes and individuals enables the Devon Historic Churches Trust to continue providing grants to help Devon's churches in their hour of need. This newsletter provides a small sample of some of the work undertaken recently with our help and gives a glimpse of a selection of our supporters out and about raising funds and having fun in the process on our Devon Historic Churches Day (incorporating the Ride+Stride) – half of which is returned immediately to participating churches.

Grants Awarded during the past 12 months

During 2014 the DHCT awarded over £70,000 in main grant funding, a selection is illustrated here:

Stairway to Heaven - a Grant with a difference



Twenty years or so ago, **Holy Trinity Church in Exmouth** was reordered, and two halls were created at the back of the church, one on the first floor, the other on the second. They were accessed by a staircase, and a lift. The Fire Officer permitted up to 150 people 'above the ground floor' at any one time.

That was then - this is now. In 2013 the current Fire Officer told the parish that the rules had changed, and the number permitted 'above the ground floor' was restricted to 60 - because there was only one means of escape - the lift didn't count. This caused major problems for the church, particularly as it is used frequently by the Community for Concerts

etc. At those events, refreshments were always served in the first floor hall - often with 120 or more there. For a year the hall became unusable for those occasions, together with lunches, Harvest Suppers etc. Rather than treat this as a disaster, the parish decided to make it an opportunity, and on the 23rd January 2015, Bishop Nick McKinnel blessed and dedicated a new £85,000 staircase connecting the first floor hall directly with the nave. The PCC were delighted to receive grant funding from various bodies, including DHCT, meaning that there was no call on either the Church members or the Parish's almost non-existent reserves. Replacement of the dove window in Escot Church, near Ottery St Mary.

The dove in the east window is very unusual. Over the years it had deteriorated, cracked and pieces had been falling out which prompted us to contact Andrew Johnson to come and have a look at it. Andrew has completed other work for us over the years, has a wealth of knowledge and knows the church well.

In order to protect the old dove window from any further damage, and eventually the new one, Andrew fitted a piece of polycarbonate to the outside. Photos were also taken.

When he was ready to complete the work the old pieces were removed taken back to the workshop where the new quatrefoil section of dove window was made by painting and firing the glass.

The day it was installed was quite nerve-wracking for us to watch. As you can see by the pictures the glass is very thin and not of a regular shape. It had to be transported up the ladder to the top of the scaffold



and then offered into the space left by the old one.

Thankfully all went well and Andrew and his colleague were able to putty in the new glass without any adjustment. Phew! I think you will agree that it looks amazing.

At some point the old pieces will be put together in a frame so that they can be displayed in church for everyone to see. To see them it is incredible to believe they have lasted for so many years.

We are thrilled with the result and grateful to the Trust for their support.

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Work to Bell Tower, St Budeaux Church, Plymouth

The 1st stage of the project was started in January 2014 and took a week; this included the lowering of the Bells from the Tower and their transportation to John Taylor's workshop in Loughbough.



During this week there were over 130 Children from Local schools (Plaistow Hill, Foundation & Marine Academy), the local Guides, Brownies & Rainbows plus other visitors, which received extensive Media coverage.

The lowering of the one of the bells was also covered by the local ITV News, the Plymouth Herald and other papers where there have been a number of stories around this project, including one thanking the trust for its support

Devon Historic Churches Trust - here to help in times of emergency

Thanks to a generous legacy from one of our supporters, the DHCT created an Emergency Fund in 2014, which has proved of immense value to churches who needed assistance urgently. Below are a couple of examples of ways we have helped under this new initiative:

St Edmunds Church, Dolton.

Following a large tree falling on the graveyard in the spring of 2014, the DHCT awarded an emergency grant of £1,000 to assist with its removal and the reinstating of fallen grave stones.

CHELDON: is a very small church just a couple of miles from Chawleigh; serving a small hamlet and is



supported by a few farming families and loyal visitors who come to its monthly service. This is a Prayer Book Evensong, still a very popular service amongst the older generation and they are fortunate in their priest, Roderick Withnell, who is as much at home with the Book of Common Prayer as he is with Common Worship. As a church community their income is small but with several fund-raising events a year they manage to pay all their regular obligations, as well as to keep the building in good repair. A small fall of masonry from their tower was speedily dealt with, thanks to generous help from DHCT. At Christmas their Carol Service congregation fills this tiny, welcoming church.


