Chairman's Report

The Devon Historic Churches Trust has had a hard working and successful year made significantly more difficult by the covid pandemic.

The continued worry about Covid and how to manage our lives remains a problem for most of us. For some it makes opening and supporting churches more complicated but for others there has been a reawakening and new determination to worship together and to continue to care for our wonderful historic buildings. There has been a lull in the demand for our grants but it is encouraging to note that requests for help and grants are now increasing.



Fundraising has been a challenge but thanks to Judith Kauntze's wonderful efforts it remains positive and the DHC day was once again a happy and successful occasion for many parishes. The advent of the e-bike has made ride and stride much more possible in our hilly county! In general our funds have held up relatively well thanks to lots of commitment and hard work from many people.

The DHCT is supported by a steadfast and excellent group of trustees, assessors, deanery representatives and our friends. The committee has had various zoom meetings but we were able to meet again in person in October. This was a good reunion and meeting and led to wide ranging discussions about the care of the Historic Churches and the grants that we give. Not only are funds tight and difficult for our churches but getting and engaging craftsmen has also become a big challenge. The other issue is about volunteers who are able to give their time and skills to our churches and the work of the trust. We would very much like to encourage new volunteers and I would love to hear from anyone who is interested.

Hon. Secretary's report

I will begin by thanking Judith Kauntze on behalf of the Trustees of Devon Historic Churches Trust and places of worship in Devon for her unstinting work with colleagues across the County and with Church and Diocesan officers. Together, they have kept the need for fundraising for church repairs and improvements in the public mind. Without this fundraising, all of us would struggle to achieve those works necessary to keep churches in reasonable condition to help attract new worshippers and make our ancient churches places conducive to worship of the Lord. It is worth reflecting that this was all achieved during the Covid -19 pandemic.

As always, I exercise my interest in the fiscal framework for the repair and improvement of churches. Thankfully, we have not had any concerns drawn to our attention by churches in Devon regarding the Heritage Lottery Fund's (HLF) Grants for Places of Worship (GPOW) and other HLF schemes but we will continue to monitor with partners what is happening both nationally and locally. It is also very important for all of us to be vigilant about the Listed Places of Worship Grant for VAT Recovery. Although there have been no serious concerns raised so far about renewal, we do need to maintain a watchful eye.

Another matter to which I have drawn your attention in the past has been the Taylor Review pilot scheme following the publication of the Taylor Review report into the Funding and Sustainability of England's Cathedrals and Churches. This pilot aims to test the impact of fabric support officers focusing on maintenance and repair of historic fabric and community development advisers helping to increase engagement beyond the worshipping community in both an urban and rural context. Both factors are important – the first for the management of buildings and the second for the potential promotion of attendances, alternative use of buildings and possibly the funding base for churches. Some lessons are now beginning to emerge from schemes in Manchester and Suffolk and we hope to report further on this matter when we have put Covid behind us.

Here in Devon we have continued to award both Main Grants and Small/Emergency Grants in the past year. Because the Trust's own funding position has been difficult on occasions we have had to make some temporary adjustments to the amounts available for grants from time to time. These grants were for works as varied as repairs to some newly uncovered wall paintings at one end of the spectrum to roof repairs to keep out the rain at the other end.

Thankfully, we are now back to our normal levels of grant. I would urge all places of worship to keep Devon Historic Churches Trust in mind when putting together a funding package to facilitate a project. If in any doubt about eligibility, please do telephone me on 01297-553666.

So far, we have come through the Covid pandemic without any major ongoing issues to cope with, and I pay great tribute to all those who give unstinting support to the Trust and places of worship – the Chairman, Archdeacons, the General Purposes



Committee, fellow Trustees, Grant Assessors and Deanery representatives through to those very keen supporters locally who give freely of their time and effort to support our major fundraising activities.

Congratulations also to all those people at individual churches who struggle so valiantly with the variety of funding sources (and the associated grant application forms), which they have to tap into to ensure that repairs and improvements can actually happen, and to those who actually manage those improvements and repairs.

The charity's revenue is derived from three sources:


the annual fund-raising day raised £34,840 (2020: £37,345),

• and donations came to £20,519


(2020: £12,749).



Small & Emergency Grants Scheme

A couple of years ago, the Trust benefitted from a legacy which has enabled them to established a fund to help Places of Worship to progress emergency repairs as quickly as possible. **Emergency Grants** of up to £1,000 are available.

The need for these repairs could arise from many causes – wind, water ingress, subsidence etc. An Emergency Grant could be required to acquire a tarpaulin to cover a sudden



hole in the roof, or for special equipment to tackle the effects of a flood. As time will be of the essence, a short and simple application process is in place.

This concept has now been extended to include

Small Grant provision, again up to a ceiling of £1,000 and with the same simple speedy process.



An Ancient Gunner's Memories of Ancient Churches!

Towards the end of the last Century on the banks of the River Taw two trout fishermen were discussing their day's sport whilst quenching their thirst with a welcome beer. One of these gentlemen, being a trustee of Devon Historic Churches Trust, extolled the wonderful work of the Trust in helping churches and he successfully persuaded his friend that it was his duty to replace him so that he could retire from the Trust and spend more time casting a fly. That is

how I became a member of the Trust.

I don't remember who it was who actually decided that I should become a Deanery Representative and Church Assessor, but it wouldn't surprise me if it wasn't the indomitable Judith Kauntze, whose persuasive powers are very hard to resist as many within the Trust will agree and which incidentally this article clearly illustrates.



The ABC of Devon Churches list churches from Abbots Bickington to Zeal Monachorum, some 860 churches of which 23 fall within the Holsworthy Deanery area for which I am the Trust's representative. Of these churches 16 have received grants from the Trust.

In my assessment visits, which have been neither exclusive to the Holsworthy area nor to Anglican churches, I have found some real gems which must start with St James, Abbots Bickington which is known as 'the church in the

farmyard'. This must be one of the smallest churches in the country seating only 22 in the 10 foot wide nave, which is dominated by a large and fine monument to Thomas Pollard in the chancel.

Sticking with the letter 'A' my next gem is St Mary,
Atherington, which has a beautifully carved rood screen of 1535 with a functioning rood loft, thought to be the only one in Devon, and a series of very fine bench ends of unusual design for Devon. There are also a number of important monuments and effigies.



My next offering is St Michael, Spreyton, which has some

excellent carved roof bosses and wall plates, of which those in the Chancel are particularly fine and include the Green Man and the Tinners' Hare bosses. The churchyard contains the grave of the famous Uncle Tom Cobley and, incidentally, there is a very fine inn of the same name in the village.

One of the more curious results from the past is that there are two churches in Devon which are in the Diocese of Truro, although well East of the River Tamar. I suggested that this curious state might allow them to apply to both Devon and Cornwall trusts but whether this succeeded I don't know. St Giles in the Heath is a small and simple church strangely situated some four miles from the village it serves and the other is St Bridget, Virginstowe, one of the few

churches without a tower I have visited.



Now from the small to the grand; St Andrew, South Tawton, is a Grade 1 listed church of impressive size which would have benefitted from what was once one of the richest parishes in Devon. It has fine barrel roofs with medieval bosses and Victorian Angel figures on the wall plates. The church has completed much work including the HLF funded roof repairs

since my first visit in 2012 and is a credit to the community. The beautifully restored C15 Church House nearby, which is a wonderful community asset, is also worth a visit.

Most assessors I am sure find Hoskin's 'Devon' most useful but in some cases rather dismissive. Take his description of St James, Jacobstowe, which states "The church was over restored in 1902 and is of no interest." As the Churchwarden of St James I feel it my duty to correct this slur as in 2015, during the excavations of the nave, foundations of a late-Saxon curved apse at the West end of the nave were discovered. This caused a great deal of excitement among the archaeological community since western apses are very rare, St Oswald's priory, Gloucester, being another. Were he to visit today I am sure he would say "A small, delightful and welcoming church with proven pre-Conquest origins.

In my time the Trust, under the firm leadership of Lady Anne Boles and from 2013 Lady Burnell-Nugent, has not only been a great pleasure to work with, and rewarding in the knowledge of the help it has been able to give to our Devon churches but also in giving the pleasure of meeting so many hard working and enthusiastic people who keep their churches going.






Devon's Churches have been a focal part of life in the county for centuries, providing both a spiritual and physical focus for the communities they serve.
