Introduction to Capital Fundraising (large appeals)



At some time or another, every church will need to raise a large amount of money for a capital campaign or project. It should not, however, be confused with planned Christian Giving. Generally speaking, the on-going mission of the Church should be funded by regular giving, while one off projects usually require external grant funding. Fundraising should therefore be an organised, planned activity.

Your fundraising aims should be aligned with the vision and mission of your church. Fundraising for capital costs involves plenty of planning and preparation, as well as securing the finances and equipment that your need to achieve your project goals.

The Church Building

If your project is making changes, alterations or extensions to the building of your church, it is important to recognise that the church is a community space as well as a sacred space.

If you are reordering your church and creating a larger, more flexible space you should be able to generate future income, however ensure that you speak to community groups and projects to identify your group of potential service users. Many churches cultural and architectural history are protected by law, and any physical alterations will need to be approved by the appropriate authorities, societies, as well as members living locally.
